Meet Jo, our new Development Officer



"It's great to be back in Bressay. My family name is Redman, I was born in York, and we spent our early years near the Lake District until our move to Shetland in 1974 when I was 4 yrs old.

A year later, we found a wonderful site on Bressay to settle down in. I was raised here at Ham Station on our self-sufficiency smallholding. We built our own house on the foundations of the old Fishing Station, and it took fifty years to finish. Now, we have dry stane dykes and established trees and shelter belts, all handmade. It all takes time, but it's been well worth it.

I've finally returned after 24 years working, fostering, and raising family sooth. I left Bressay with my husband-to-be and his Shetland family in 1999. I worked in Hampshire and Northamptonshire in many different roles. In industry, manufacturing, print and graphics, care work, horticulture, retail and hospitality and sales to name but a few. I've also enjoyed volunteering in the local school, rainbows and scouts.

I attended the Bressay Primary School and Anderson High School. On leaving school I first worked in the Faroe Islands in the Sjomanshaemid in Runavik.

I took part in Stuart Hay's wonderful global classroom back in its early days. I participated in an exchange with two Swedish girls who were to bide in Bressay for one year. I studied then at the Riddarfjaerskolan of Music and Art in Stockholm. In Scandinavia, I witnessed an inspiring approach to creativity, learning how to improvise and loosen up. I'd welcome a dose of that every year to be honest! After completing my BA Hons Degree at Glasgow School of Art I came back to Shetland.

I got the commission to produce a sculpture for the opening of the North Atlantic Fisheries College in Scalloway. The sculpture shows a flight of 'Tirriks' in aluminium. For this, Malakoff taught me welding and it remains in situ, prevailing at the sea's edge.

In gratitude to Malakoff, I assisted in the production of presentation boards for their flat bottom aluminium boats, attending a Brussels trade fair. Suddenly the need to give Shetland an identity and help promote Shetland skills and amenities became very much apparent.

After market research and training at Shetland Enterprise, Artmachine was formed. I formed a partnership with 'JJ' then, and for the first 10 years we developed Artmachine to employ several staff in both Orkney and Shetland. Artmachine still operates today. The business began in Bressay. Initially run from 1 Hamilton Park's sitting room. We then upgraded to mum and dad's goat shed. It's amazing what can grow from humble beginnings in a repurposed goat shed.

I have taken delight in seeing ideas flourish in all aspects of Shetland culture. I've found that to make a start you need a base. Bressay Development and Speldiburn Hub is just that kind of place where ideas can grow. What is so amazing now is that it has become a social and central resource to Bressay. Something which I would have greatly loved to have been around when we first worked on Bressay.

I'm looking forward to continuing to build on the strengths of Bressay development work in my new role as a BDL officer, sharing my position with Aimee Labourne."

Bressay Bees!

Gareth Powell, People Engagement Officer for RSPB, tells us here about his recent work in Bressay.

"Voar. A glimmer of warmth, the return of wings, the emergence of colour to the hills and cliffs as we dust off the winter. Then a slight hum, maybe a buzz. Out of its hibernation lumbers a queen bumblebee. Sheltering through the winter in carefully dug holes they are ready to head out and start their new nests. Amongst these is our very own Shetland bumblebee, the Drummie Bee. With bright orange and yellow hairs, it's distinctive from our other bees both in appearance but also in its scarcity. Only in the Hebrides can you find the same bumblebee. Species on the Edge is stepping in to improve habitat, protect nesting sites, and increase food sources. We also need people to go out and survey the bumblebees in their area.

This spring, the Wednesday Social Group made model bees, painted to represent our different species, to be used at a oumblebee ID workshop in April. The day of the workshop brought sun as attendees walked the roads looking for the models and occasional live queen as it bumbled on its way. Thanks to the Wednesday Social Group for the time and the laughs and thanks to all who attended the workshop! Look out for bumblebees while you're out walking this spring!" Bressay History Group news

Local Historian and teacher. Ion Sandison provided an excellent and thoroughly informative talk to a full house on the 26th of March. Jon walked us through the roles Bressay and Shetland played in both world wars beginning before the outbreak of WWI, in spring 1914, with a story about the Shetland Territorial Companies of the Gordon Highlanders. Several trips were intended to bring the men over to Bressay, but the weather was very much against them. Not everyone made it and most of their plans had to be abandoned. However, Bressay hospitality was good and the cold wet territorials were provided with tea in the Hall. By November most of these men would find themselves fighting in France. Bressay's strategic position was evident in the photos lon number of German Navy vessels visiting Lerwick in July 1904. presented, many new to us, including the early plans for the Admiralty watch tower on Anderhill, the WWI guns and Bressay Heritage Centre is open 1st May to 28th September numerous navy vessels in Bressay Sound. on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays 10am - 4pm.
